In this edition's recipe is Ms. Diaz's special Empanadas. This recipe is special to Ms. Diaz because she met her husband because of the empanadas. Fun fact, empanadas are famous in Columbia, too. Empanadas also originated in Latin America. She learned this recipe from her husband and mother-in-law when she was 28.

HOW TO MAKE MS. DIAZ'S SPECIAL EMPANADAS!

Ingredients

1 pound of corn flour

1/4 cup butter

1 tablespoon of salt

1 cup warm water

Vegetable oil for frying

Sliced onion

Minced garlic

1 pound of ground beef

Salt and pepper to taste

Other: pan, rolling pin, plastic wrap, coffee cup, large pot or dutch oven

How to Prepare:

- Prepare the dough by mixing 1 pound of corn flour and the 1/4 cup of butter, 1 tablespoon of salt, and 1 cup of warm water.

- Knead until dough forms.
- Then in a separate pan prepare the filling. Heat up vegetable oil in the pan. Add sliced onion and minced garlic to the pan. Cook until translucent. Then add 1 pound ground beef and cook until browned. Add salt and pepper to taste. Once cooked, let the filling cool.
- Grab a small hand full of dough and roll into a ball. Repeat until all of the dough is rolled into golf ball sized balls. Lay plastic wrap on your work surface. Take a ball of dough and press it with your hands to make it flat like a pancake. Lay your flattened dough on the plastic wrap and cover with more plastic wrap. Use a rolling pin to roll out your dough even thinner.
- Then remove the plastic and add two tablespoons of filling onto the flattened dough. Fold the dough over top of the filling using the plastic wrap to help you. Use a coffee cup or a small bowl to cut the dough filling into a half moon empanada shape. Repeat until you have filled and formed all of the dough and filling into an empanada.
- To cook the empanadas, get a large pot or dutch oven. Put several inches of vegetable oil into the pot to fry the empanadas. Fry empanadas until golden brown.
- Remove empanadas from the pot/dutch oven and place on paper towels to absorb extra oil.
- Serve hot.

National Smarties Day!

October 2 was National Smarties Day. In celebration of this day we are bringing you some facts about smarties.

Who created smarties? "Edward Dee was the founder of Smarties Candy Company and the inventor of the sweet candy discs, packaged in rolls and especially popular on Halloween. A native of England from a candy-making family, Dee immigrated to the U.S. in 1949 and made the first Smarties in a garage in Bloomfield, New Jersey. Naming his candy Smarties to promote the value of getting an education, Dee grew the business into a factory in nearby Union, which today is still family-run and produces more than one billion rolls of Smarties each year. Dee also founded the cellophane business Northern Expediting, which provides wrappers for Smarties and other candies."

Why are smarties called smarties? "Smarties are a type of fruit-flavored tablet candy produced by smarties candy company, since 1949. BUT WHY ARE THEY CALLED SMARTIES?? The verb "to smart" means to have one's face pucker which supposedly happens when you eat smarties."

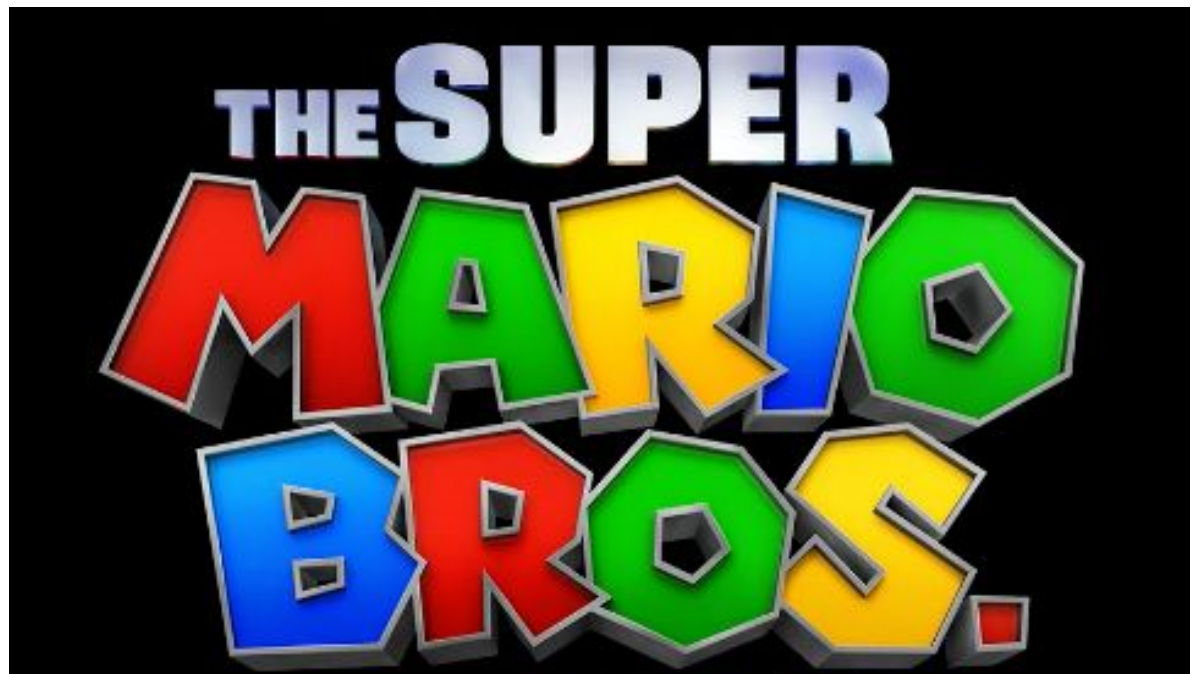

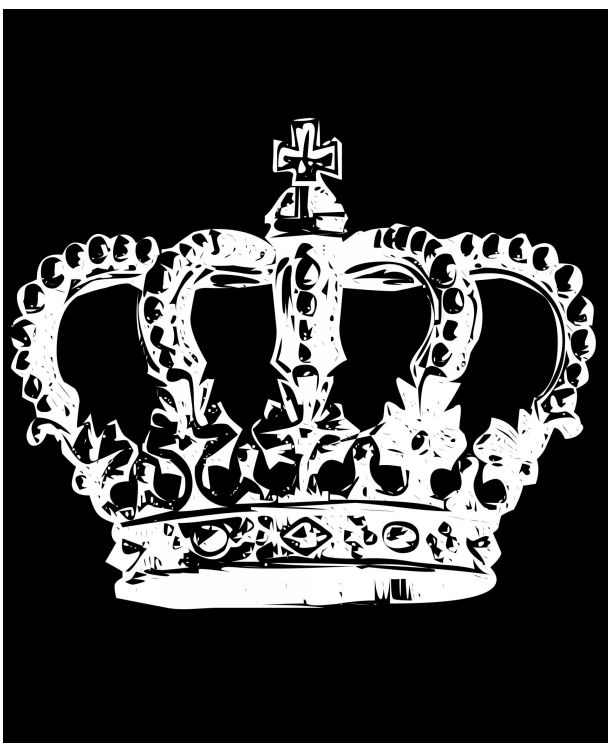

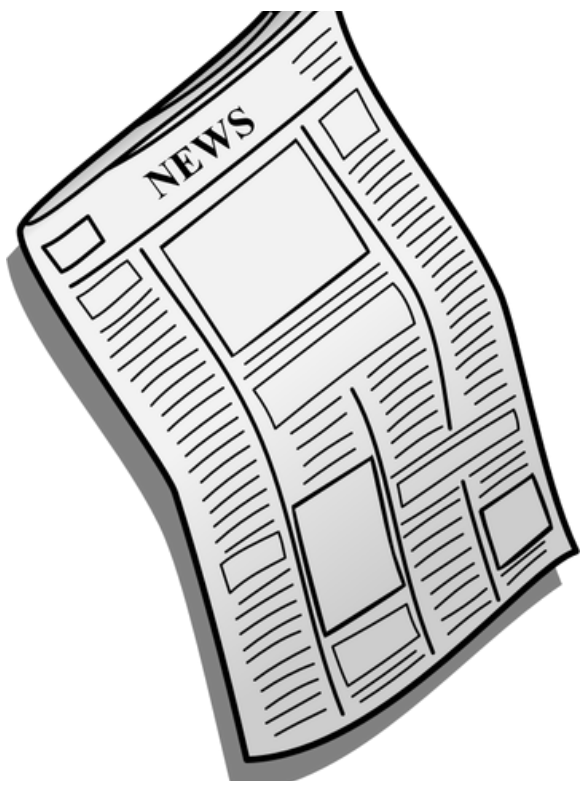
